From higher ed to health care to high tech, from finance to real estate to science and research, Spartanburg is home to some of the region's most dynamic companies.

Spartanburg is a city with opportunity to spare, home to seven institutions of higher learning, a highly rated and rapidly growing regional healthcare system, and a downtown that has become a magnet for corporate headquarters. The result is a City that offers a diverse mix of employment opportunities in the health care, higher ed, high tech, and finance sectors, among others. In the past three years alone, the Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine, USC Upstate's George Dean Johnson Jr. School of Business, and Spartanburg Community College have all opened new campuses in or adjacent to the City's central business district, bringing hundreds of new jobs and thousands of new students downtown. They are joined inside the city limits by Wofford College and Converse College, highly regarded private liberal arts colleges that are also experiencing a period of growth and campus expansion and revitalization.

No fewer than 10 new corporate headquarters have relocated to Downtown Spartanburg over the past few years, and Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System has emerged as one of the most dynamic healthcare systems in the region, with more than 5,000 employees and plans for a multi-million dollar capital expansion on the drawing board. It all adds up to a City on the move, the perfect place for starting or continuing a career in some of the nation's fastest growing fields.

Great Schools

Spartanburg is home to some of the most highly rated public schools in the state.

Spartanburg High School, in fact, was the first four-time National Blue Ribbon School, has been named one of the most rigorous high schools in the nation by the Washington Post, and today boasts more AP class offerings — 24 — than any other public high school in South Carolina. Meanwhile, Pine Street Elementary School's arts-infused curriculum is considered a national model, while other elementary schools provide opportunities such as a Montessori program and a Science, Technology and Mathematics focused curriculm.

Spartanburg,SC Fact Sheet

Spartanburg is the county seat and the oldest and most populous incorporated city in Spartanburg County. In 1789, the foundations of centralized government were laid when a courthouse and jail were built in the area. On December 17, 1831 Spartanburg was incorporated, and its town limits were extended one mile in every direction from the courthouse. Spartanburgh Village had a population of 300 in 1825, and by 1850, the County population had grown to almost 26,500. Since 1960, Spartanburg has been a magnet for new industry, and over \$1 billion has been invested for new and expanded facilities.
